One of the guiding principles in working with children with special educational needs is the necessity for them to be given frequent instructions when carrying out a series of actions (i.e. the information to be given to them gradually and in small steps).

Augmented reality or AR is an innovative technology which interacts with the real world by injecting digital content. With its help, computer-generated objects can be seen in the real world. Generally, augmented reality is a medium that combines virtual reality and elements of the real world. In the most common case, the users use their smartphone cameras to see digital objects in the physical world.
