# STATEMENT FROM MILITARY VETERANS ADVOCACY ON THE FAILURE OF THE UNITED STATES SENATE TO PASS THE BLUE WATER NAVY VIETNAM VETERANS ACT, HR 299

Although we are disappointed in the failure of the Senate to pass the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act, we are determined to continue seeking relief for these sick and dying veterans and their families. It is disheartening that the Senate would refuse to restore the benefits to the tens of thousands of suffering veterans exposed to herbicide

during the Vietnam War. This bill was passed unanimously by the House of Representatives on June 25, 2018. These veterans, stationed in the bays, harbors and territorial seas of the Republic of Vietnam, are suffering from multiple medical conditions. The costs of survival have devastated them financially, resulting in many losing their homes as they try to survive the effects of herbicide exposure.

Last year we enjoyed the support of then Secretary of Veterans Affairs David Shulkin who testified on several occasions that this bill should be passed. The inexplicable reversal after Secretary Shulkin's departure was a significant blow to the Blue Water Navy veterans. Of increasing concern is the fanatic opposition which has led the VA to intentionally provide false information to Congress. Inaccurate VA claims that the science does not support extending benefits coupled with intentional inflation of actual costs have successfully confused the issues and led to the defeat of the bill in the Senate. This betrayal by the very agency that was designed to assist veterans is troubling.

It is unfortunate that Congress has become obsessed with the cost of benefits and, in the case of the Blue Water Navy, strict enforcement of the offset inaccurate of the Pay As You Go Act. For the second consecutive Congress a small minority of Senators have used budgetary rules to justify the defeat of the bill.

We enjoyed the support of the Fleet Reserve Association, the Association of the U, S, Navy, AMVETS, Vietnam Veterans of America, Miliary Officers Association of America, Jewish War Veterans and many other members of the Military Coalition. We thank them for thir support and look forward to working with them in the future.

As well as returning to Congress, Military-Veterans Advocacy and the Blue Water Navy veterans anxiously await a decision by the Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit in the case of Procopio v. Wilkie. A favorable decision in this case will extend the coverage to the same area as the Blue Water Navy bill.

Military-Veterans Advocacy wishes to thank out many supporters in the Congress and in public for their support, We have come closer this year than we ever have before. We are not giving up, We are not going away. We will be back to challenge the unconscionable VA action in Congress and the courts.

## Military-Veterans Advocacy's Statement on the Introduction of a Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Bill

Military-Veterans Advocacy, the primary stakeholder along with the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Association just discovered that Dr Phil Roe of TN the Ranking Member on House Committee on Veterans Affairs has introduced another Blue Water Navy bill using the same verbiage as the bill that failed the Senate last year. The Blue Water Navy bill passed the House unanimously but died in the Senate due to multiple holds.

Military-Veterans Advocacy Executive Director,
Commander John B Wells, USN (ret) stated that the reintroduction was "premature." Wells, the author of the
original bill, worked closely with the Committee on the
language defining the scope of coverage. MVA is currently
working on revised language to clarify the area of
coverage, in response to a statement by the Congressional
Budget Office that the scope of the bill had been expanded.

"While we appreciate Dr. Roe's, current and present support," Wells said, "we need to address lessons learned from the 115th Congress to ensure the bill will pass in this Congress. We have asked Dr. Roe to work with Military-Veterans Advocacy to perfect the bill before it moves forward."

A court case brought by Military-Veterans Advocacy,

Procopio v. Wilkie, is pending a decision before the full Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit. A favorable decision will expand the presumption of exposure to the territorial sea, the same area covered by the bill. A decision is expected sometime next Spring.

## Ranking Member Roe Introduces the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019

Washington, D.C. - Today, Rep. Phil Roe, M.D. (R-Tenn.) Ranking Member of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs introduced the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019.

"The Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 would ensure that our Vietnam Veterans receive the benefits they deserve. This bill mirrors the language of the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2018, which passed the House 382 - 0 during the 115th Congress. One of my final acts as Chairman in 2018 was holding a bipartisan press conference to urge the Senate to pass H.R 299. Needless to say, despite the endless efforts of Senate Veterans Affairs' Committee Chairman Isakson and Ranking Member Tester, the Senate never passed the legislation. This is why

I have introduced this bill that mirrors the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2018 and I encourage my colleagues in the House to once again swiftly pass this bipartisan piece of legislation.

"Currently, Blue Water Navy Vietnam veterans are unable to receive the presumption of exposure to Agent Orange because VA's presumption policy extends only to those who served on land in Vietnam or in Vietnam's inland waterways. This legislation would extend the presumption of exposure of Agent Orange to our Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans. I hope that my colleagues in the House and Senate waste no time in passing this bill and sending it to President Trump so we can ensure that Blue Water Navy Vietnam veterans receive the benefits they deserve."

#### Background:

Agent Orange is a herbicide used during the Vietnam era that has been known to be associated with certain health issues in people who have been exposed to the chemical. The Agent Orange Act of 1991 said that if a veteran served in Vietnam between 1962 and 1975 and has a disease that has been associated with exposure to Agent Orange, they are automatically presumed to have a been exposed to it and therefore qualify for disability compensation. The Blue Water Navy Veterans Act of 2019 would extend the presumption of exposure to Agent Orange to veterans who served in the Blue Water Navy.





#### Navy Updates Selective Reenlistment Bonus

The U.S. Navy has updated the Selective Reenlistment Bonus (SRB) award plan for active component and full time support sailors. They also announced a pay for performance pilot program. Increased award levels are effective immediately. The pilot program for sailors in seven ratings will give an additional 0.5 multiple or "kicker" to their reenlistment bonus. Eligible Sailors looking to reenlist under SRB are encouraged to work with their command career counselor, command master chief and chain of command to discuss their reenlistment well before their EAOS. Sailors can stay informed of award changes through the Navy's SRB webpage.

The Navy Wants Applicants for National Intelligence University

The Navy is looking for enlisted information warfare sailors to attend the National Intelligence University (NIU). ## Navy Updates Enlisted Advancement Calculation

The current enlisted advancement Final Multiple Score (FMS) calculation process will see changes beginning with the spring 2019 Active Duty and Selected Reserve (SELRES) advancement cycles. Aimed at "rewarding sailors demonstrating sustained superior performance," the FMS changes include updates to the computation process of the Performance Mark Average (PMA), reduction of the number of cycles for Pass Not Advanced (PNA) points, changes to the Service in Paygrade (SIPG) factor and the discontinuation of Individual Augmentee (IA) Points. **Veterans in 116th Congress** 

A total of 96 military veterans were sworn in yesterday as members of the 116th Congress. According to an Army Times article, 19 are serving in the Senate and 77 in the House, for an overall veteran percentage of 17.9 percent. Four decades ago the percentage of military veterans in Congress exceeded 70 percent. Of the 96 veterans, only 44 are eligible for VFW membership, with 28 currently being members in good standing. Other demographics:

- 48 served in the military after the year 2000;
- 30 are Democrats and 66 are Republicans;
- 19 are first-time lawmakers; and
- 7 are women

**2019 Military Pay Rates Released** 

On Jan. 1, DOD released the monthly basic pay rates for 2019. The 2.6 percent raise is the largest since the 3.4 percent increase in 2010, and 0.3 percent larger than last year's raise. In terms of direct impacts on service members, junior officers and senior enlisted can expect to see about \$1,300 more a year, junior enlisted can expect to see about \$670 more a year, and senior officers with more than 12 years of service will receive approximately \$2,300 more per year. The increase is based on a yearly federal calculation that is designed to keep military pay rates on par with private sector wages; however, the VFW has long advocated for a more realistic calculation. #### **MIA Update**

This week, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced six new identifications. Returning home with full military honors are:

**Army Cpl. John G. Krebs** was a member of Company L, 3rd Battalion, 21st Infantry Regiment, 24th Infantry Division, and engaged in combat operations against the North Korean People's Army south of Chonui, South Korea, when he was declared missing in action. Interment services are pending. Read about Krebs.

Army Pfc. James C. Williams was a member of Medical Company, 34th Infantry Regiment, 24th Infantry Division, when he was killed in action near Taejon, South Korea. Fellow soldiers returned Williams' remains to the collection point. After his death, the 34th Infantry Regiment's Medical Company was ordered to withdraw, and his remains were left behind. Interment services are pending. Read about Williams.

Army Air Forces 1st Lt. Burleigh E. Curtis was a member of the 377th Fighter Squadron, 362nd Fighter Group. On June 13, 1944, the P-47D that Curtis was piloting crashed during a dive-bomb attack near Briouze, France. Interment services are pending. Read about Curtis.

**Army Pfc. William F. Delaney** was a member of Company A, 1st Battalion, 22nd Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry

Division, when his battalion launched a massive firing demonstration against a large pocket of German defenders near the town of Grosshau, in the Hürtgen Forest in Germany. During the battle, an enemy artillery shell struck Delaney's foxhole, and he died before he could be medically evacuated. Due to ongoing combat operations, his remains were not recovered at that time. Interment services are pending. Read about Delaney.

Navy Machinist's Mate 1st Class George Hanson was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The battleship sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Hanson. Interment services are pending. Read about Hanson.

Navy Steward 2nd Class Felicismo Florese was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The battleship sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Florese. Interment services are pending. Read about Florese.
