could do, take us a little out of our way, a little off the beaten path. We have Toys-For-Tots run by the Marine Corps, we have many Veteran Service Organizations who have various programs, some even offering a hot meal on Christmas to our Homeless Veterans, Wreaths Across America to provide a Christmas wreath on each Veterans grave, all you need to do is reach out. # **MILITARY VETERANS' ADVOCATES URGE EXPEDITED RULES FOR GUAM VETERANS**

A national Veterans organization is asking Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert Wilkie to expedite the agency's creation of rules to compensate Veterans who served on Guam and Johnston Island and were exposed to Agent Orange.

Military-Veterans Advocacy, a Louisiana-based non-profit, first made the request a year ago. Last Spring, MVA representatives met with Wilkie who said he would look into the issue. Wilkie visited Guam in July, but no policies have yet been crafted or implemented to provide care to sick and terminally ill Veterans with Agent Orange-related illnesses.

"MVA has acquired and presented substantial evidence that Veterans who served on Guam between 1972 and 1980, and on Johnston Island from 1972 to 1977, were exposed to the toxins of Agent Orange," said Cdr. John Wells (USN, Ret.), lead attorney for MVA. "Secretary Wilkie has that information. We understand that federal agencies

require some time to implement policies and new rules, but our first request to Sec. Wilkie on this matter was on Dec. 3, 2018 - 366 days ago. Veterans are sick and dying and can't get proper benefits from the VA."

MVA has long pressed the Department of Veterans Affairs to extend proper benefits to military Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange and other toxins while serving the country. Last year, MVA won a landmark case, Procopio v. Wilkie, requiring the VA to recognize the exposure of U.S. Navy personnel who served in the harbors and territorial seas of Vietnam. Wilkie placed an administrative stay order on implementation of that recognition.

"More and more, it seems the VA's policy is to stall long enough so that all affected Veterans die," said MVA Executive Director Col. Rob Maness (USAF, Ret.). "We're not going away, and we're not going to stop advocating for these Veterans."

## **FEDERAL COURT RULING CLEARS WAY FOR BLUE WATER NAVY CLAIMS**

The Federal Circuit Court of Appeals ruled yesterday that the Department of Veterans Affairs may not extend a stay on claims from Blue Water Navy Veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange in the harbors and territorial seas of Vietnam.

Although the Court declined to immediately lift the stay, as requested by Military Veterans Advocacy, it also said the stay may not be extended beyond Jan. 1, 2020, clearing the way for as many as 90,000 affected Veterans to begin seeking

benefits for exposure to the toxin.

President George H.W. Bush signed a law recognizing the legitimacy of such claims, but in 1997 the VA arbitrarily refused to recognize them. Last January, MVA, a Louisiana-based advocacy non-profit, won a landmark case in *Procopio v. Wilkie*, obligating the Department of Veterans Affairs to accept claims from Navy servicemen who were aboard ships in impacted waters. VA Secretary Robert Wilkie issued an administrative stay order through the end of 2019, and MVA sought legal remedy.

For years, MVA has presented evidence to Congress and the VA that runoff from Vietnam included the toxins from Agent Orange, which was pulled into water filtration systems on Navy ships offshore, affecting servicemen who never set foot on Vietnamese soil. Despite the *Procopio* win, Congress last spring passed a new bill to serve these Veterans' needs but allowed for administrative tinkering with the implementation. MVA withdrew its support before passage, but other Veterans service organizations maintained pressure on Congress to pass the measure


without regard for the unintended consequences.

"This is a great win," said Col. Rob Maness (USAF, Ret.). The court told the government in no uncertain terms that there is no authority to stay anything past January 1. The jurisdictional finding will also be important in future cases. We thank the Court for the quick response and insightful analysis."

**New Sponsor for Military Retiree  
Survivor Comfort Act**

In the wake of Rep. Walter B. Jones (S.C.) passing, Rep. John Garamendi (Calif.) has become lead sponsor of FRA-supported Military Retiree Survivor Comfort Act (H.R.463). This bill would authorize the retention of the full final month's retired pay by the surviving spouse (or other designated survivor) for the month in which the member was alive for at least 24 hours.

Surviving spouses who are unaware that the Defense Finance and Accounting Services (DFAS) should be immediately notified about the death of the military retiree, are surprised to learn of this requirement. Those who had joint bank accounts, which retirement payments were made electronically, gave little if any thought that DFAS could swoop down and recoup any overpayments of retirement pay from such accounts. This action could easily clear the account of any remaining funds whether they were retirement payments or money from other sources. All these proposals go to the Senate for further consideration.

## **Remembering Our Fallen at Pearl Harbor**

On the 78th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor, the VFW solemnly honors the 2,403 men and women who died in the devastating attack Dec. 7, 1941. VFW National Commander William “Doc” Schmitz, along with VFW Auxiliary National President Peggy Haake, will travel to Pearl Harbor Saturday to lay a wreath in remembrance of the 2,008 sailors, 109 Marines, 218 soldiers, and 68 civilians we tragically lost without warning and without a declaration of war. “December 7, 1941, remains one of the most-heartbreaking days in our history as a nation,” said Schmitz. “And while we suffered tragic loss that day, our nation stood in unity and quickly recovered. Today, I ask every American to pay their respects to these patriots, and their loved ones, for making the ultimate sacrifice. You will, and must, never be forgotten.”

**House Committee Passes the  
IMPROVE Well-Being for Veterans  
Act**

On Thursday, the House Veterans' Affairs Committee held a markup hearing to consider H.R. 3495, the IMPROVE Well-Being for Veterans Act. The bill passed the committee and can now be voted on by the full House of Representatives. H.R. 3495 creates a three-year pilot program that would offer grants to community providers who offer services that target factors that contribute to suicide such as financial stress, relationship, stress, readjustment and community integration issues, housing insecurity, and others. The goal is to reach the two-thirds of Veterans who commit suicide and have not utilized VA prior to their suicides. [Watch the hearing.](#)

## **Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans eligible for benefits on 1 January 2020 by P.L. 116-23**

Important information if you are a Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans or a surviving spouse you are entitled to VA benefit starting 1 January 2020, in accordance with P.L. 116-23. Please read the FAQs below provided by the National Veterans Legal Service Program (NVLSP). For legal assistance go to:

A major change in law occurred in 2019 that should enable thousands of Veterans who served on ships in the waters offshore Vietnam to obtain

VA disability benefits for diseases associated with exposure to Agent Orange. The change in law should also enable survivors of these Veterans to obtain VA death compensation for deaths due to diseases associated with Agent Orange exposure.

**Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs):** This document provides answers to the most frequently asked questions we are getting from Blue Water Vietnam Veterans (as those who served in the waters offshore Vietnam are commonly called) and their survivors about the recent change in law.

1) What is this change in law and how did it come about?

Earlier this year in a case called *Procopio v. Wilkie*, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit concluded that the Agent Orange Act of 1991 requires VA to presume that those who served in the territorial waters offshore Vietnam were exposed to Agent Orange. The Court ruled that this presumption applies to all Veterans who served within 12 nautical miles of Vietnam during the Vietnam War.

Congress then enacted the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 Public Law 116-23 and incorporated the Procopio decision. The Act states that a Veteran who, during active military, naval, or air service, served offshore of the Republic of Vietnam during the period of beginning on January 9, 1962, and ending on May 7, 1975, shall be presumed to have been exposed to Agent Orange. The term offshore is defined as no more than 12 nautical miles seaward of a line commencing on the southwestern demarcation line of the waters of Vietnam and Cambodia.

2) What does this change in law mean for Blue Water Vietnam Veterans?

It means that a Veteran covered by Procopio and

the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 should become entitled to service-connected disability benefits if the Veteran (1) files a claim for disability benefits with the VA and (2) suffers from one of the diseases that VA recognizes as associated with Agent Orange exposure.

3) What does this change in law mean for survivors of deceased Blue Water Vietnam Veterans?

It means that a qualifying survivor, such as a surviving spouse, of a Veteran who (1) is covered by Procopio and the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 and (2) died from a disease that VA recognizes as associated with Agent Orange exposure, should become entitled to service-connected death compensation (known as DIC) if the survivor files a DIC claim.

4) What diseases are now recognized by the VA as associated with Agent Orange?

- B-cell prolymphocytic leukemia
- Precursor B lymphoblastic leukemia
- Diffuse large B-cell lymphoma
- Follicular lymphoma
- Mucosa-associated lymphatic tissue lymphoma (MALT)
- Small cell lymphocytic lymphoma
- Mantle cell lymphoma (MCL)
- Burkitt lymphoma
- Mediastinal large B-cell lymphoma
- Waldenström macroglobulinemia
- Nodal marginal zone B-cell lymphoma
- Splenic marginal zone lymphoma
- Extranodal marginal zone B-cell lymphoma
- Intravascular large B-cell lymphoma
- Primary effusion lymphoma
- Lymphomatoid granulomatosis
- Early-onset peripheral neuropathy
- Chloracne
- Porphyria cutanea tarda

5) Do I need to file another claim if I already filed a VA claim for benefits for an Agent Orange-related disease and that claim is still pending at

the VA?

No. If you are sure that your claim for an Agent Orange-related disease is still pending, you do not need to file another claim. However, you may wish to file a statement with VA in support of your pending claim stating that you are entitled to benefits under Procopio and the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019.

6) Do I need to file another claim if my previous claim for an Agent Orange-related disease was finally denied by the VA and is no longer pending?  
Yes. You need to file another claim.

7) How do I file a VA claim for service-connected disability benefits?

If you have **not** previously filed a disability claim for a disease VA now recognizes as associated with Agent Orange, you should file a claim for these benefits using VA Form 21-526EZ

(available here:

<https://www.vba.va.gov/pubs/forms/VBA-21-526EZ-ARE.pdf>).

If you previously filed a disability claim for a disease VA now recognizes as associated with Agent Orange and the VA finally denied that claim, you should file a supplemental claim for disability compensation for that disease using VA Form 20-0995 (available here: <https://www.vba.va.gov/pubs/forms/VBA-20-0995-ARE.pdf>). On that form, you should check the box for “compensation” in block 12, and write the following language in box 13A: “I am entitled to disability benefits for [put in name of your Agent Orange related disease] under the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 and Procopio.” In block 13B of that form, you should write the date of the VA decision that denied you benefits for that disease. If you don’t know the date, we suggest that you write the following language in block 13B: “See my claims file for date of denial of my claim for [put in name of your Agent Orange related disease].”

In order to help ensure you are awarded the earliest possible effective date for benefits, you should not delay in filing a VA claim.

8) How do I file a DIC claim?

If you have not previously filed a claim for DIC, you should file an initial claim for DIC using a VA Form 21P-534EZ (available here:

<https://www.vba.va.gov/pubs/forms/VBA-21P-534EZ-ARE.pdf>).

If you previously filed a claim for DIC and the VA finally denied that claim, you should file a supplemental claim for DIC using a VA Form 20-0995 (available here:

<https://www.vba.va.gov/pubs/forms/VBA-20-0995-ARE.pdf>).

On that form you should check the box for “pension/survivors benefits” in block 12, and write the following language in box 13A: “Because of the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 and Procopio, I am entitled to DIC given that [put in name of the Agent Orange related disease that led to the Veteran’s death] led to the Veteran’s death.” In block 13B of that form, you should write the date of the VA decision that denied you DIC benefits. If you don’t know the date, we suggest that you write the following language in block 13B: “See my claims file for date VA denied DIC.”

In order to help ensure you are awarded the

earliest possible effective date for benefits, you should not delay in filing a VA claim.

9) If my claim is granted, how much will I be entitled to in retroactive benefits?

The effective date assigned by the VA to awards of disability and DIC benefits is usually the date the claim was received by the VA. For example, if VA grants benefits based on the Veteran's first claim for an Agent Orange-related disease and that claim was filed in January 2019, the Veteran will be assigned an effective date in (and will be paid retroactive compensation to) January 2019.

However, if the VA grants benefits based on a Veteran's second or third claim for the same Agent Orange-related disease, the effective date of the award should be retroactive to the date the VA received the Veteran's first claim for that disease -- as long that claim was received by VA after September 24, 1985.

This means, for example, that if a Veteran filed a disability claim for type 2 diabetes that VA received in 2003 and the VA denied it, and the

Veteran now files a second disability claim for type 2 diabetes, the Veterans should receive disability compensation retroactive to 2003 -- as long as the Veteran served within the 12 nautical mile limit and has suffered from diabetes since at least 2003.

10) Do I need to add evidence to my claim to prove that I served within 12 nautical miles of Vietnam?

Maybe yes. Maybe no. VA has a duty to Veterans (and survivors) who apply for VA benefits to assist them in obtaining the evidence necessary to substantiate their claims. In many cases, it may be clear to the VA from the military service and VA documents already in your claims file that you served within 12 nautical miles of the shore. For example, if these records show you served on a ship when it was located in a harbor of Vietnam, then it will be obvious to the VA that you served within the 12 nautical mile limit.

In other cases, it may not be obvious from a review of the documents in your VA claims file. In these cases, you should inform the VA of the

name of the ship on which you served and the dates you were on the ship, and ask the VA to obtain a copy of the deck logs of the ship. You should also ask the VA to send you a copy of the deck logs that they obtain.

11) What if the VA is unable to obtain the deck logs of my ship?

In the unlikely event that the VA is unable to obtain the deck logs of your ship, you should submit a statement to the VA with your claim explaining why you believe your ship was within 12 nautical miles of the shore (for example, “during our deployment in 1967, we could see the landmass of Vietnam. My division officer informed me that the land we saw was Vietnam;” or, “I was a quartermaster and know from our plotted position on navigation charts that the ship was within 12 nautical miles of the coast of Vietnam.”). You should also try to obtain written statements from fellow crewmembers who were aware that the ship was within 12 nautical miles of the coast and submit them to the VA.

12) How long will it take for VA to decide my claim

for a disease recognized by VA as associated with Agent Orange?

In June 2019, VA Secretary Wilkie ordered the VA regional offices and the Board of Veterans' Appeals to hold off making any decisions on claims that are based on service in the offshore waters of Vietnam and a disease that VA recognizes as associated with Agent Orange exposure. This includes disability compensation and DIC claims. This moratorium on deciding claims will remain in effect until January 1, 2020. Therefore, do not expect a decision on your claim until next year.

13) Will NVLSP be able to represent Veterans and their surviving family members before the VA on their Agent Orange claims?

We regret that the answer is no. We advise you to obtain a representative from a Veterans service organization located in your state. You can find a Veterans service organization that will assist you for free at

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

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## **Don't Be Scammed**

Below are the details of the latest scam targeting Veterans. This scam is particularly scary because it imitates the 1-800-827-1000 number as well as

VA identity verification protocol. There is never a need to provide VA with credit card information.

Veterans beware! There is a new scam sweeping the country targeting U.S. Veterans. This one involves the use of new telephonic technology, and a well-orchestrated cast of scam artists who mimic Veterans Affairs (VA) culture.

Unfortunately, the scam has already ripped off thousands of Veterans – don't be the next victim.

The scam uses sophisticated telephonic technology that imitates VA operating signatures, thus, giving the impression via caller ID that the Veteran is receiving a telephone call from the VA. Most Veterans will see the following on their call ID system: "Department of Veterans Affairs, 1-800-827-1000." The second part of the scam involves scam artists pretending to be VA personnel. The scam artists are using scripted material to mimic the culture of VA personnel by implementing processes that would be used when a Veteran contacts the VA. Most Veterans are getting the following:

**PHONE CALL SCAM/MESSAGE:**

**Scam artists:** “Hello, Mr. Smith, this is John from the VA, I’m contacting you because the VA is reaching out to Veterans to ensure the accuracy of their records with us. Do you have a minute to go over your records at the VA?”

Veteran: “Yes!”

**Scam artists:** “Before I get started, thank you for your service.”

Veteran: “No problem.”

**Scam artists:** “Mr. Smith, can you verify what branch of the military you served?”

Veteran: “The Army.”

**Scam artists:** “Ok. Thank you. Can you verify your current address?”

Veteran: “555 Main St., Topeka, Kansas.”

**Scam artists:** “Ok. Great! Can you verify your birthday?”

Veteran: “July 10, 1947.”

**Scam artists:** “Please verify your last compensation payment amount.”

At this point, if the Veteran provides information and gives an amount, the scam artists are using another script that eventually leads to asking the Veteran to verify their social security number. If the Veteran refuses to give information, the scam artists inform the Veteran that he/she needs to be transferred to the Finance department. Then, the scam continues as:

**Scam artists:** “This is Mike in the Finance department. How are you, Mr. Smith?”

Veteran: “I’m ok.”

**Scam artists:** “As John mentioned to you, we [VA] are reaching out to Veterans to ensure the accuracy of their information on file with the VA. We want to make sure nothing happens to your current or future payments from the VA. Is that ok with you Mr. Smith?”

Veteran: “Sure.”

**Scam artists:** “Mr. Smith can you verify your social security number on file with the VA?”

Veteran: “123-12-1234”

**Scam artists:** “Great! Thank you. Also, can you

verify the credit card we have on file for you?”

Veteran: “I don’t have a credit card on file with the VA. Do I need to have a credit card on file?”

**Scam artists:** “Yes! To make sure any incidentals are covered. In 99.9% of the cases, the credit card is never used, and if the credit card is used it will never exceed \$10. Public law and VA policy make it necessary we have a credit card on file just in case something comes up that is not covered by the VA. So, what card would you like to keep on file? We take Visa, MasterCard, American Express or Discover. Which would you like to use?”

If you get a call from the “VA” and the scenario resembles anything close to the narrative above, terminate the telephone call. It is likely you are being scammed.



The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced three new identifications, and four burial updates for service members who have been missing and unaccounted-for from WWII and the Korean War. Returning home for burial with full military honors are:

**Navy Fireman 1st Class Leo T. Keninger**, 20, was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma was hit multiple times which caused it to capsize quickly and caused the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Keninger. Interment services are pending. [Read about Keninger.](#)

**Navy Seaman 1st Class Orval A. Tranbarger**, 20, was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma was hit multiple times which caused it to capsize quickly and caused the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Tranbarger. Interment services are pending. [Read about Tranbarger.](#)

**Army Master Sgt. Harold F. Drews**, 21, was assigned to King Company, 3rd Battalion, 31st Infantry Regiment, 7th Infantry Division. For several days, his unit was engaged in intense fighting with the Chinese People's Volunteer Forces near the Chosin Reservoir in North Korea. Drews went missing in action on Dec. 12, 1950. His remains could not be recovered. Interment Services are pending. [Read about Drews.](#)

**Army Sgt. 1st Class Riley Burchfield**, 22, of Cleveland, was a member of Company D, 1st Battalion, 24th Infantry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division. He was captured by enemy forces near Kunu-ri, North Korea on Nov. 26, 1950. He reportedly died while in custody of the Chinese People's Volunteer Forces at Prisoner of War Camp 5 in February 1951. Burchfield will be buried Jan. 10, 2020, in his hometown. [Read about Burchfield.](#)

**Army Air Forces 1st Lt. Steve Nagy**, 23, of Lorain, Ohio, was a member of the 407th Bombardment Squadron (Heavy,) 92nd Bombardment Group (Heavy,) 40th Combat Bombardment Wing, 1st Air Division, 8th Air

Force. On Aug. 24, 1944, Nagy piloted a B-17G Flying Fortress aircraft, carrying nine crewmembers, which was struck by German anti-aircraft fire and crashed during a bombing raid over Merseburg, Germany. Four crewmembers survived and were captured by German forces, while five, including Nagy, were killed. Nagy will be buried in his hometown. The date has yet to be determined. [Read about Nagy.](#)

**Navy Quartermaster 2nd Class Daryle E.**

**Artley**, 21, of Maywood, Nebraska, was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma was hit multiple times which caused it to capsize quickly and caused the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Artley. Artley will be buried May 15, 2020, in Vancouver, Washington. **Navy Chief Water Tender Frances D. Day**, 37, of Milburn, New Jersey, was stationed aboard the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS

Oklahoma was hit multiple times which caused it to capsize quickly and caused the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Day. Day will be buried at the Punchbowl. The date has yet to be determined.
