Good evening Jim,

This past Thursday I spent some time on the phone talking with a Veteran who got his Mental Health Social Worker, and now works for a private company who provides service to Veterans.

We had discussed a couple of issues, one which has been resolved, and was a personal issue for him. He had applied for disability benefit and like almost everyone else had to fight for them, and finally did receive his letter of approval for 100% disability, but, took more than ten years to actually get his benefits and finally only because he used an attorney.

I have spoken to many Vets who too were approved, various percentages of ratings, received a letter, but didn't begin to receive benefits for as much as five years.

I would love to hear from any of our Veterans who have been approved, received your letter of approval telling me your circumstances and current status of your benefits.

Another issue we spoke about were Veteran who were granted benefits for Mental Health, referred to an outside source for care, then told you had to wait for "X" number of weeks, there weren't sufficient funds or any other excuse given.

Both issues are very important to me, and not that I will be able to get them resolved, but I can at least put my foot in the door and say hey, Houston, we have a problem! And see where it takes me into helping get more answers for our Veterans.

We've also begun a fax blast to the Senate asking

for their support and for a YES vote on 22 pieces of legislation now in their possession. And that will be the starting point to keep on them to pass all of them as quickly as possible. (They are all noted below in the press release from VVA)

Your help is also needed, most are listed in the **TAKE ACTION** portion of the newsletter, please help us to help you. Send each one out, again some might be duplicates, but they are from different organizations so it's an added push.

We've also changed the **TAKE ACTION** section just a little bit, and will note how many are being added to the list and this decision was made based on communications with another Veteran. So, if we note two were added, then they'd be the last two items in the list.

Monday, May 3rd is Constitution Memorial Day, maybe that would be a great day to remind your Rep and Senators of their obligation to keep their oath of office to protect and defend the Constitution against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

A week from Sunday, May 9th is Mother's Day! Whatever you do, don't forget your mother! If you've not visited our website, www.veterans-forchange.org or not visited in a while, please be sure to check often for updates on documents, web links, etc., we are a bit slow, but are moving as fast as we can, yet not over-loading to put more work on our Webmaster when we get to the transition into the new look.

### Bill Promotes Gender Equality in the Cost of Uniforms

Congresswomen Julia Brownley (Calif.), Jackie Speier (Calif.), and Elise Stefanik (N.Y.) introduced the "Equal Pay for Servicewomen Act" (H.R.2502), which would direct the Department of Defense (DoD) to ensure gender equity in the cost of uniforms, a measure that ensures equal pay for all who serve in our nation's military. The bill would incorporate the four legislative recommendations of a recent Government Accountability Office (GAO) report on the parity of military uniform costs.

The FY2020 National Defense Authorization Act directed the GAO to analyze gender disparities in out-of-pocket uniform costs for men and women servicemembers. Brownley's amendment required GAO to compare out-of-pocket uniform costs for men and women servicemembers in each of the Services of the Armed Forces, as well as past required uniform changes that have affected one gender more than the other. This language was retained in the final agreement, which was signed into law.

In February 2021, the GAO released the required report which found that across all branches of service and ranks, women in the military pay several times more than men in out-of-pocket costs for uniforms, a violation of DoD's principles of equal pay for equal work. In addition, DoD does not collect uniform data for officers because officers pay for their uniforms out-of-pocket. However, in the past 10 years, the services have made 18 changes to uniforms that disproportionately increased out-ofpocket costs for female officers. Because these disparities add up to hundreds or thousands of dollars over time, women are being paid less than men across the military. You may read the GAO report online.

### Veteran restaurant business owners eligible for \$28.6 Billion Restaurant Revitalization Fund

The U.S. Small Business Administration will begin registrations at 9 a.m. April 30 and open applications at noon May 3 for the Restaurant Revitalization Fund. ### Improvements to Veterans Training Law Passes the House

The House approved a bill (H.R.2523) to retrain veterans out of work as a result of the COVID-19

pandemic. This legislation, sponsor by Rep. Mike Levin (Calif.) would make changes to the Veteran Rapid Retraining Assistance Program that become part of the American Rescue Plan Act (H.R.1319, P.L.117-2). The bill provides as much as 12 months of assistance to veterans who are unemployed because of the pandemic to receive training for high-demand jobs or in high-technology programs. The measure would also add requirements and penalties for schools that participate in VA educational programs. The bill now goes to the Senate for further consideration.





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

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The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced two burial updates and five new identifications for service members who have been missing and unaccounted-for from World War II and Korea. Returning home for burial with full military honors are:

Navy Radioman 3rd Class Theodore Q. Jensen, 22, of Delta, Utah, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Jensen. He will be buried on June 2, 2021, in his hometown. Read about Jensen.

Army Air Forces 2nd Lt. William H. Melville, 20, of Minneapolis, was a pilot assigned to the 36th

Fighter Squadron, 8th Fighter Group. On Oct. 28, 1943, he was on a combat mission over the island of New Guinea, Australian Territory of Papua, when his aircraft and two others disappeared after encountering severe weather. Search and recovery efforts in the days following were unable to find any of the aircraft. Melville will be buried July 16, 2021, in his hometown. Read about Melville.

**Army Pfc. Philip T. Hoogacker**, 23, was a member of Company D, 1st Battalion, 29th Infantry Regiment. He was reported missing in action on July 27, 1950, after his unit was attacked near Anui, South Korea. He was last seen after receiving first aid for a minor shrapnel wound. DPAA historians believe Hoogacker was captured by the Korean People's Army and forcibly marched to Seoul and then on to Pyongyang, where he died as a prisoner of war. Interment services are pending. Read about Hoogacker.

Army Air Forces 2nd Lt. Ernest N. Vienneau, 25, was a pilot assigned to the 340th Bombardment Squadron, 97th Bombardment Group, 15th Air Force, based out of Amendola, Italy. On Nov. 6, 1944, the bomber on which he was serving as copilot came under heavy anti-aircraft fire while on a mission over Maribor, Yugoslavia, in present-day Slovenia. During the barrage, a piece of flak penetrated the cockpit and struck Vienneau in the head, mortally wounding him. Interment services are pending. Read about Vienneau.

#### Navy Water Tender 1st Class Charles E.

**Hudson**, 39, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Hudson. Interment services are pending. Read about Hudson.

Navy Seaman 1st Class Walter C. Stein, 20, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Stein. Interment services are pending.
