House Passes NDAA

As NewsBytes goes to press, the House is expected to pass the FY2022 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R.4350). The FRA supported floor amendments pertaining to concurrent receipt and survivor benefits were not called for a vote. Key provisions in the House NDAA include:

- No new TRICARE fee increase;
- Prohibiting any reduction or realignment of military medical staff at Military Treatment Facilities (MTF) until a review of medical manpower requirements by the GAO can be conducted;
- Providing an annual active duty pay increase that keeps pace with civilian pay increases (2.7 percent);
- Establishing the Naval Community College as a degree granting institution for enlisted sailors;
- Requiring the Defense Department to pay basic needs

allowance to a qualified service member;

• Expanding the in-home childcare pilot program providing financial assistance for in-home childcare;

• Requiring all Americans ages 18 to 26, regardless of gender, to register with the Selective Service beginning one year after enactment of NDAA;

• Directing DoD to notify survivors of sexual assault about the outcomes of any administrative action taken against their perpetrator; and

• Removing the commander from decisions related to prosecution of sexual assault and sexual harassment crimes and criminalizes sexual harassment under the Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ).

The Senate Armed Services Committee has approved its version of the FY2022 NDAA and the full Senate is expected to debate floor amendments and approve its version later this year. Once both chambers approve their bill, a conference committee will be appointed to resolve the differences between the two bills and then submit a final bill to be voted on in the House and Senate. If the bill is approved, it will be sent to the president to be signed into law or vetoed.

CR and Debt Limit Suspension Combined

The House approved a Continuing Resolution (H.R.5304) to keep the government running after Sep. 30, 2021, that includes an extension of the debt limit suspension until Dec. 16, 2022.

A Continuing Resolution (CR) keeps the government funded beginning Oct. 1, 2021, the start of the new fiscal year. This will give Congress time to merge the 12 regular appropriations (spending) bills into one larger "omnibus" spending bill that can pass each chamber and be signed into law by the president.

The debt limit came back into effect at \$28.4 trillion on Aug. 1, 2021, following a two-year suspension. The Treasury Department is using "extraordinary measures" such as delaying certain payments to allow the government to finance operations. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen claims these measures will run out in October. Suspending the current limit through Dec. 16, 2022, would enable the U.S. government to continue to borrow money to pay its bills.

The bill now goes to the Senate for further consideration.



LGBT Veterans with OTH Discharges Will Get VA Benefits

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced that LGBT veterans with Other-then-Honorable (OTH) discharges because of their sexual preference will be allowed to receive full VA benefits despite their dismissal status. The change comes as the country approaches the 10th anniversary of repeal of the "don't ask, don't tell" (DADT) law which prohibited gays and lesbians from serving openly in the military. The policy was issued under Department of Defense Directive 1304.26 and was in effect from Feb. 28, 1994, until Sept. 20, 2011. Legislation to repeal DADT was enacted in December 2011. The VA insisted the new guidance does not amount to a change in law, which would require an act of Congress. Rather, the VA contends it's merely a clarification of the existing policy because veterans discharged under Don't Ask Don't Tell are already "generally eligible for benefits under current statute and regulation."

When you retire from active duty or retire from the National Guard or Reserve, you'll experience a TRICARE Qualifying Life Event (QLE). QLEs open a 90-day window where you can enroll in a new TRICARE health plan or change your coverage.

Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers to provide an additional year for eligibility and reassessment of certain participants.

The Department of Veterans Affairs is extending PCAFC legacy applicant's eligibility through September 30, 2022, in a final rule published in the Federal Register on September 21, 2021, to provide more time to complete reassessments. Executive Director of the VA's Caregiver Support Program, Dr. Colleen Richardson expects that about 6,700 of the 19,800 veterans enrolled will no longer qualify for the PCAFC under standardized rules previously published. This includes all current tier 1 participants and up to 2% of tier 2 and 3 participants. She hopes to finish all reassessments by the end of March, 2022, and any applicants found to no longer qualify under the new standards will continue to receive benefits and payments for at least 12 months. They will receive a notification of 60 days of due process, and then an additional 90 days of benefits. Essentially, said Richardson, they will receive an additional 17 months of benefits.

The Department of Veterans Affairs'Program, family caregiver program expansion to include veterans who served on or before May 7, 1975, began on October 1, 2020, as authorized in the Mission Acts, P.L. 115-182, Subtitle C established the expansion of the VA Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC) sections 161-162.

House passed bills

H.R. 4350, the \$778 billion appropriations bill for FY2022 National Defense Authorization Act, passed the House by a 316-113 vote.

S.189, The Veterans Compensation Cost-of-Living Adjustment Act of 2021 has passed the house. This requires the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to increase, as of November 30, 2021, wartime disability compensation, additional compensation for dependents, clothing allowances, and dependency and indemnity compensation to surviving spouses and children by the same percentage as Social Security benefits are increased. The bill is headed to the President's level desk for enactment.

H.R 5293, which extends several expiring authorities within the VA, also passed the House. The bill now goes to the Senate for further action.

H.R. 5305, Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act, a bill making continuing appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and for providing emergency assistance, and for other purposes. The bill before the Senate which passed the House on September 21, 2021 by 220-211 vote provides continuing FY2022 appropriations for federal agencies through December 3, 2021, suspends the debt limit, provides supplemental appropriations, and extends several expiring programs and authorities. In addition, the bill provides supplemental appropriations to several federal agencies for activities related to natural disasters and the evacuees from Afghanistan.

The bill suspends the public debt limit through December 16, 2022. On December 17, 2022, the limit will be increased to accommodate obligations issued during the suspension period.

The bill also extends several expiring programs and authorities, including

- the National Flood Insurance Program,
- the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program,
- National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity,
- United States Advisory Commission on Public Diplomacy,
- the temporary scheduling order issued by the Drug Enforcement Administration to place fentanyl-related substances in Schedule I of the Controlled Substances Act, and

• The authority for the Department of Agriculture to waive certain requirements for the school meal programs.

President's level

The Senate is expected to vote on the H.R. 5305 Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act when the Senate reconvenes on September 27, 2021.


