This-N-That

Good evening Jim,

We have uploaded a number of new documents under the category of "Medical Reports". Our goal was 200+ and we fell short of that goal, but we have uploaded 165. In addition, we've opened up the "Medical Reports" to anyone with or without and account.

We are working on an additional 200+ documents, and an estimated 70+ more weblinks over this coming week.

So, do check often, you never know what you might find that could be useful to you, a family member or friend.

Secretary Denis McDonough talks about claims backlog,

homeless COVID-19 Vaccinations, but didn't offer much in real resolutions to backlog in claims or dealing with homelessness.

I know one of the worst areas is at the West Los Angeles VAMC.

Several years back the ACLU filed a lawsuit representing the homeless Veteran population and for the most part won, then the VA changed its policies on land leasing to private companies and for many years that rental income was not accounted for, and to my knowledge still hasn't been, nor has there been any investigation on where those funds went.

Not long after that we had the Mayor of Los Angeles, Barbara Boxer and two members of the House do a press conference on the WLA VAMC lawn promising to address the problem quickly and to this date some fourteen years later there has been absolutely zero action taken, zero resolution and matters only seem to be getting worse.

I know we presented the VAMC with a plan to not only resolve the problem, but also make it much easier for those Veterans who are homeless to be much closer to medical services as well as guidance and assistance into being integrated back into society.

Excluding buildings that are currently being leased out to Brentwood elites there are still a few hundred acres of land available to put up a rather large number of pre-fabricated mini homes, most range in cost from \$5k-\$7k which to me is rather cheap.

They come fully equipped with bedroom, mini-kitchen, stove, stacking washer/dryer, dish washer, bed and household

furniture they simply need to be delivered and connected to water, sewage, electricity, and phone line. And I'm sure if they contracted with a cable service at least minimal service could be provided as well.

All it would cost the VA is the cost of each unit, installing water, sewage, electrical and telephone lines. Additionally, they could build a small facility in the middle where they have medical staff, a visiting nurse who could do wellness checks, etc.

I simply don't understand how Congress and the VA could turn their backs on those who served and are in this position.

I understand that a number of homeless Veterans don't want this, but there are many who do need assistance and we should never turn our backs on them, ever!

I know we don't have any current legislation on the table to deal with Homeless Veterans, but we do have over 70 bills and why I push so hard for everyone to participate in the **TAKE ACTION** program.

There are countless Veterans who need help in many ways, can't get it because it's not on the books to cover them and why the legislation is presented, and some still on the table for discussion, but many are sitting dormant as we're not putting enough pressure on them to take action vs. trying to shove through a \$3.5 trillion "Infrastructure" plan that would in essence put our country into a \$29+ Trillion Dollar Deficit.

So, again I ask you to please, help us to help you by taking action on each and every item every week.

VA secretary talks claims backlog, homelessness, COVID-19 vaccinations during press conference

Veteran disability claims, homelessness and COVID-19 vaccines were topics VA Secretary Denis McDonough spoke about during a press conference Oct. 20 in Washington D.C. More than 3,800 toxic exposure claims have been approved for Gulf War Veterans, and McDonough noted that this is the first time Veterans from that era received presumptive status on claims for asthma, sinusitis and rhinitis. Veterans have received millions of dollars in benefits so far at about a 62% approval rate.



- Hopelessness, feeling like there's no way out
- Anxiety, agitation, sleeplessness, or mood swings
- Feeling like there is no reason to live
- Rage or anger
- Engaging in risky activities without thinking
- Increasing alcohol or drug abuse
- Withdrawing from family and friends

The presence of the following signs requires immediate attention:

- Thinking about hurting or killing themselves
- Looking for ways to kill themselves
- Talking about death, dying or suicide
- Self-destructive behavior such as drug abuse

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VA firemen drive 1,000 miles for Veteran's last trip home

A terminally ill Veteran's dying wish was to be surrounded by his loved ones when he passes. The Chillicothe VA fire department made the eight hour drive with the Veteran to his home where he died peacefully.

"As a Veteran and as a human, having the ability and opportunity to make this Veteran's last moments easier for him and his family made the almost 24 hours on the road absolutely worth it. I would do it again right now without hesitation," said VA firefighter, Mike Menendez.

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VA police chief helps struggling Veteran three years after they met

VA Providence Chief of Police, John Thibodeau gave a struggling Veteran his card three years ago. Fast forward three years later, the Veteran reached out to him.

"I had lost contact with him but he called me," said Thibodeau.
"I could tell by his mental state that he was in distress."

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Thibodeau convinced the young Veteran to get to the VA Tucson facility. There, he connected with the acting chief of police who got him the health care he needed.

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Chats with the Chief: Dr. Eric Schoomaker, VHA's Whole Health Advisor on Why VA wants to know what matters to you



VFW Urges Navy to Honor Hero

VFW National Commander Matthew "Fritz" Mihelcic sent a letter urging Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro to name the newest commissioned surface ship the "USS Telesforo Trinidad" after a sailor who earned the Medal of Honor for his heroic actions on Jan. 21, 1915. Fireman Second Class Telesforo de la Crux Trinidad is the only Filipino in the U.S. Navy to have received this award. "The high honor of naming United States Navy ships is the prerogative of the Secretary of the Navy," Mihelcic wrote, "and there is no ship in the United States Naval fleet with a name that recognizes the Asian Pacific Islanders legacy and their unique alliance forged in war and peace." House Holds Hearing on Pending Legislation

The House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs held a hearing on pending legislation focused on survivor benefits, VA disability claims for military sexual trauma, and fiduciary program improvements. Included in the discussion was H.R. 3402, the Caring for Survivors Act of 2021. This bill concerns a VFW priority issue and would increase the Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) to 55%, making it the same as what other federal survivor programs offer. 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House Passes Bill to Give Medal to Service Members Killed in Afghanistan The House unanimously passed a bill (H.R.5142) to posthumously award the Congressional Gold Medal to the 13 U.S. troops killed in a bomb blast outside the Hamid Karzai International Airport, Kabul. Eleven Marines, one Navy sailor and one Army soldier died from the explosion set off by a suicide bomber near the airport on August 26, 2021. In addition, 18 U.S. service members were injured. The bill sponsored by Rep. Lisa McClain (Mich.) will go to the Senate for further consideration.



Changes Coming to TRICARE Pharmacy Network

After three years, Walmart is leaving TRICARE's pharmacy network - a departure that pharmacy benefit manager Express Scripts Inc. says is a result of the retail giant's reluctance




to offer "more highly competitive discounts" to military health beneficiaries. At the same time, CVS Pharmacy will return to the TRICARE network after a five-year pause. Also, effective Dec. 15, 2021, Sam's Club will no longer be a part of the TRICARE pharmacy network, and CVS will be included among the list of network retail pharmacies where TRICARE users can fill their prescriptions. VA will Start Collecting Over-payment and Medical Co-pays

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is restarting over-payment notices for new debts and debts that were paused during the COVID-19 pandemic from April 6, 2020, through Sept. 30, 2021. Although debt collections and collections on medical copayments restarted on Oct. 1, 2021, VA will not begin to deduct debts from benefits payments until January 2022. The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced seven burial updates and three new identifications for service members who have been missing and unaccounted-for from World War II and Korea. Returning home for burial with full military honors are:

Army Staff Sgt. William R. Linder, 30, Piedmont, South Carolina, was assigned to Company E, 12th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action on Nov. 16, 1944, after his unit was part of the Hürtgen Forest offensive, near Hürtgen, Germany. Following the battle, his remains could not be recovered. He will be buried Oct. 29, 2021, in Anderson, South Carolina. Read about Linder.

Army Pvt. Emmet W. Schwartz, 24, of Dover, Ohio, was assigned to Company F, 2nd Battalion, 121st Infantry Regiment, 8th Infantry Division. He was reported killed in action on Dec. 27, 1944, by an artillery blast while his unit was part of an effort to capture Obermaubach, Germany. Following the battle, his remains could not be recovered. He will be buried Nov. 18, 2021, in New Philadelphia, Ohio. Read about Schwartz.

Navy Fireman 1st Class James O. McDonald, 25, of Levelland, Texas, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including McDonald. He will be buried Jan. 19, 2022, at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu. Read about McDonald.

Navy Seaman 1st Class Walter C. Stein, 20, of Cheyenne,

Wyoming, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Stein. He will be buried on March 23, 2022, at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia. Read about Stein.

Army Cpl. Robert C. Agard, Jr., 19, of Buffalo, New York, was assigned to 2nd Platoon, 24th Reconnaissance Company, 24th Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action on July 19, 1950, while conducting a night recon patrol with his unit near Tejon, South Korea. Following the war, his remains could not be identified. He will be buried May 30, 2022, in Elmira, New York. Read about Agard.

Navy Mess Attendant 1st Class Octavius Mabine, 21, of Portsmouth, Virginia, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Mabine. He will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia. The date has yet to be determined. Read about Mabine.

Navy Ship's Cook 1st Class Rodger C. Butts, 47, of Portsmouth, Virginia, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship

resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Butts. He will be buried in Newton, Pennsylvania. The date has yet to be determined. Read about Butts.

Navy Fireman 2nd Class Edward E. Casinger, 21, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Casinger. Interment services are pending. Read about Casinger.

Navy Fireman 1st Class Hal J. Allison, 21, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Allison. Interment services are pending. Read about Allison.

Army Sgt. Howard R. Belden, 19, was assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 31st Infantry Regiment, 7th Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action on Dec. 1, 1950, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. Following the battle, his remains could not be recovered. Interment services are pending. Read about Belden.





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
